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Icebreaker Keeps Homeless Warm in Manchester

This year, Ellie Smith from Barton Moss Secure Children's Centre, Manchester took part in the Crisis Icebreaker Challenge which involved a cold dip a day, throughout the whole of January to raise money for Crisis, with a group who have been doing it for the past 6 years. This will be their 7th year and they've raised £143K in those years. This year they raised a staggering £13,494!

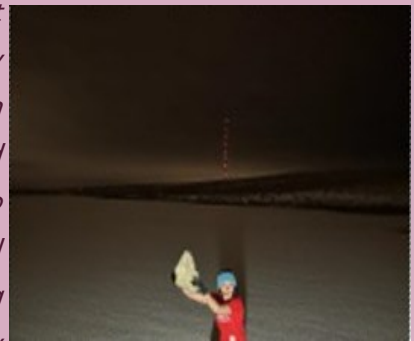
Ellie has been cold water swimming for 4 years (all year round), in only her swimsuit, even when she has had to smash the ice to get into the water, but she has never dipped every day. Ellie explains that it's always been at her leisure, so this was challenging but she kept in mind that "after each dip I get to go home and shower and get in warm clothes, and the people I am doing this for don't have that option!" She continued "I absolutely



loved the challenge, and to be completing it with a group of people who all supported each other was imperative. The coldest scariest dip was the ice dip, we had to use an axe to break a hole in the frozen reservoir. I will definitely be doing it again next year!" **Crisis UK thanked her personally and wrote:**

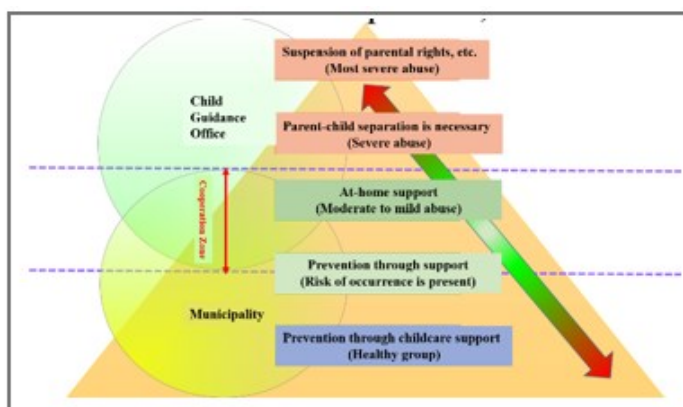

Adel Beck Secure Children's Home (Leeds) were visited by the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Child Guidance Office (TMGCGO), which is the Japanese version of managing child protection related cases and incidents. It is heavily based on psychological models of care and is not dissimilar to SECURE STAIRS and the integrated care principles and framework used in secure children's homes in the UK. Their staff are either Psychologists or qualified Social Workers.

The TMGCGO visited the UK as part of a field study from the end of February to the beginning of March 2024. Their purpose was to visit child welfare facilities, learn about various initiatives in this field and use this information to improve Japan's welfare standards. Most of the visitors were from the child protection field and they came to learn through the exchange of ideas which would have a "mutual benefit" to both Adel Beck and the TMGCGO.

Adel Beck delivered a presentation on the purpose of the home and how we used DDP and PACE principles as part of our integrated care model. Mr. Akitomo Takahashi, Specialist and Director and his psychologist colleagues (TMGCGO) were particularly interested in how managers who had high levels of responsibility in being accountable for managing risk, where supported and managed the stresses that such leadership roles presented.

This was an unusual discussion as most similar discussions relate to how managers support staff and how staff support young people. It did show that in Japan, there is a high level of support and recognition that being a senior manager in this area of work requires recognition and different types of support for leaders who can never really "switch off" even when not at work... ..Some food for thought!

A tour of the home was well received by the young people; one who took on the role of a "tour guide" explaining how Adel Beck functions and how he responded to the education and care that he received whilst being with us...heartwarming stuff it was.

Finally, the exchange of presents was well received by both Adel Beck and Mr. Takahashi.

For some unknown coincidental reason, we both exchanged "tea" related gifts. Adel Beck offered a mixture of Yorkshire tea, chocolate

(never knew there was such a thing) and mugs with the TMGCGO providing Japanese tea & confectionery.

On this day we celebrated our pupil's achievements with an assembly and certificate giving. Young people, all staff and OFSTED enjoyed breakfast cooked by our Young People. We decorated our Christmas tree, designed baubles, took part in a tombola,

designed t-shirts, played juice pong, took part in a quiz, baked and

decorated Christmas biscuits, enjoyed treats created by our fabulous kitchen staff and we were treated to a turkey roll lunch with all the trimmings.



Hillside Celebrate in Style!



In observance of Universal Children's Day, Hillside (the only Secure Children's Home in Wales) arranged a variety of child centred events with the help of other organisations and professionals. Among them were a Spoken Word Artist, a Local Counsellor, and an Engagement and Participation Officer from Neath Port Talbot Children and Youth Council.

The first activity was called "Protect the Egg," and it served as a resettlement exercise to prepare the children in readiness to leave Hillside.

The activity involved using lollipop sticks to construct a "nest" in which the children would right different areas and avenues they felt would be most beneficial and impactful to them and help them succeed following their transition. These included, a trusted adult, access to education, co-produced innovations, safe and supportive communities



and easy access to expertise.

The aim of the activity was that each child was their egg and the areas on the sticks that created their nest would protect them and keep them safe when they leave Hillside. After completing the activity, they then had some fun smashing their eggs and were able to enjoy a treat at the end!

Following this, a local spoken word artist facilitated a group to sum up the 'art' of the day and created a rap/poem including all the young people and their attributes. All children and staff from Hillside took part and they really enjoyed!



Vinney Green Construct a Better Future With MCS

A new and exciting collaboration between MCS and Vinney Green Secure Children's Home will help young people gain valuable insights into a career in the construction industry.

Danielle Haskings and Veda Hill, Social Value team & Enterprise Advisor, have been working with Rona Chellew (Careers Leader) in coordinating a series of activities aimed at raising aspirations & helping their young people with the skills & knowledge needed for employment.



One of the key initiatives organised by the partnership is the Careers Carousel, scheduled during the recent National Careers Week. The event will see local construction organisations participating to showcase apprenticeship programmes, work experience opportunities, and various career paths available in the construction sector. Acorn Recruitment, a local business, will also be actively involved, offering guidance on crafting effective CVs and honing interview techniques.



A highlight of National Apprenticeship Week was the visit of local business owner Junior Saunders, who transformed his life from a background in care to becoming a successful business owner. He will share his personal journey and discuss the importance of mindset and belief. Notably, he will shed light on how a criminal record did not hinder his path to success, serving as an inspiring example for the young individuals at Vinney Green.

A requirement to a career in the construction industry is a **CSCS** card. MCS has supported Vinney Green in becoming a registered **CSCS** card examination centre and the availability of this will have a significant impact on the young person's employability. This initiative ensures that the young people at Vinney Green have the opportunity to obtain their CSCS cards before leaving, making them fully prepared for the workforce.

The **CSCS** card, widely recognised in the construction industry, is a valuable asset for those seeking employment in this field. This new collaboration between MCS and Vinney Green Secure Children's Home is a testament to the



power of community engagement and social value in fostering positive change. We envisage that this will be the start of a strong and long-term relationship that will provide mentorship, resources, and practical support, so that both organisations are contributing to the development of a skilled and empowered workforce for the future.

There's Snow Fun like Panto Fun at Swanwick Lodge

As part of our December enrichment programme, the young people at Swanwick wrote, practised, and performed their very own Christmas pantomime

Staff Profile



Each edition of “**The SANctuary**” will focus on a colleague who works within a secure children's home. In this edition, please meet Megan Sheridan from Adel Beck SCH, Leeds.

Megan is the Office Manager at Adel Beck where she started working in 2014 as an Admin Assistant.

The admin team went through a period of short staffing. During this time Megan had to adopt several roles in order to maintain the level of service and output expected by the Home.

Whilst at Adel Beck, Megan has utilised her system development skills set to create, maintain and implement several records management systems. Megan is currently part of a team that are implementing a new records management system not only at Adel Beck but in all of Leeds City Councils Residential Children's Homes.

Although it isn't Megan's area of expertise, she is often the go to person for IT related queries. An increasingly important area that Megan supports is recruitment, which is a very challenging task, completing recruitment and DBS checks for all new starters at Adel Beck.
